Winterize your baby... If you can't bring them into the house

We tend to think of Hallowe'en as almost the end of riding season, but an early snow caught us by surprise this year. Our thoughts turn to winter storage.

As with everything from oil threads to **helmet comms**, every rider has his or her strong opinions on winterizing. One rider said the best winterizing is to ride it to Mexico and stay there.

For those of us who won't be spending our winter in Puerto Vallarta or Cabo San Lucas, we're faced with some decisions about winterization.

Ideally bikes should winter in heated storage facilities so they don't even know what's going on outside. For the rest of us, there are steps we can take to ensure our bikes are not angry with us come Spring.

1.) Clean your bike. A good wash and a coat of hard wax will help keep that showroom-shine finish in place over the winter. Leftover road grime, insect guts,

If you're cold, they're cold; bring them inside. If your spouse won't let you do that, make sure you follow these winter storage tips and tricks.

oil and salt will dull the finish over time. This is especially true of **chrome**. Some riders mist their bike's metal parts with **WD-40**. Good time to touch up **rock** chips too.

2.) Find secure storage. You want your bike to be there in the spring. Heated indoors is best of course. Member Lorne noticed his elderly neighbour had a garage and no car, so he **traded** bike storage space for snow clearing. Rental space is available; check Facebook Marketplace.

3. If you haven't done so recently, change the oil. This is a bit controversial. Some claim used oil is acidic and will eat away at crank bearings and other components. Others say this is **bull puckey**.

4. Do your regular maintenance.

Lubricate anything that should move; tighten anything that moves but shouldn't. Good time to check fluids (clear good, coffee-coloured bad.) Check wheel and neck **bearings**, belt, fork

The group left promptly because they had a schedule to keep. Vice Prez John B was waiting for them at Highway 9 and Vic Winder was picked up at the Beiseker intersection.

The group then made their way into **Drumheller**, then south to **Rosedale** where they crossed 10 of the legendary

swinging and bouncing to fairly safe levels.

The bridge was originally built to allow **miners** access and egress to the coal mine on the north side of the river.

Following a **gas fill-up** at the bikebusy Shell station in Drumheller, the group headed back to their various homes via **Highway 9.**


seals, air filter, brake pads, rotors, lights and any other consumables. Pedants will even mist the **pistons.**

- 5.) Fill the **gas** tank to prevent rust. Add fuel stabilizer or **SeaFoam** to prevent **ethanol** damage. All gasoline now contains ethanol so don't neglect this. Run the bike a bit after you add the stabilizer so it makes it down to the **injectors.**
- 6.) Unless you have heated indoor storage, remove the **battery** and bring it inside. Either way, hook up a "smart" battery tender to it.
- 7.) **Cover** it. Outdoors or unheated needs a good-fitting cover. Inside, a dust cover is sufficient. A **fitted sheet** from Goodwill will keep the dust off your bike as well as a \$260 Indian Pursuit cover does.
- 8.) If your storage site is shared with **mice or squirrels**, plug any holes where they could build nests or store winter food. Air box and exhausts are popular larder for vermin.
- 9.) Get **tires** off the ground? Again this is controversial; some say modern tire compounds don't require this. Others say floors, particularly **concrete** can damage tires. Flip a coin.
- 10.) More controversy: **start the bike** occasionally? (Difficult to do with the battery removed.) Some say occasional starting does no good and may even be hard on the battery and motor. The latter because all the oil from the heads has settled into the sump, so you are, in essence, **dry starting** it every time. Open for debate.

What part of your winter storage routine **did we miss** here?
